The Alliance for Child Protection in Humanitarian Action (the Alliance) held the 2021 Annual Meeting on Child Protection in Humanitarian Action over a virtual platform from the 4th of October 2021 to the 8th of October 2021. The Annual Meeting was an opportunity for Child Protection actors to come together and exchange knowledge and experience, while networking with other agencies, academics, policy makers and donors. This year's theme, Preventing Harm to Children, was selected to explore the lessons learnt, promising practices and innovative approaches to preventing harm to children in humanitarian contexts. The meeting explored primary prevention approaches that address risk and protective that negatively impact children in particular humanitarian settings, alongside examples of prevention programming in emergencies from other sectors. Key Findings: Summary


- Risk factors included: displacement, psychosocial distress, unmet basic needs
- Many children believed that a risk factor was their own misconduct and their poor behavior was the reason for the increase in physical and emotional punishment
- Nearly all protective factors identified in the time before the conflict (access to school, recreation activities and friends, sense of community, access to livelihoods, safety and security, being with family and neighbors) had eroded
- The one key protective factor that remained was that the children were with their primary caregivers; however, it was the primary caregivers responsible for the increase in child maltreatment






We are live for Day 1's thematic sessions! We begin with the first thematic session, "Preventing Harm to Children and Strengthening Caregiving Environments" moderated by Kristine Mikhailidi. Sophia Backhaus welcomes us to the first thematic session with her presentation on "Parenting Interventions in Humanitarian Settings – Are we reducing child maltreatment? A systematic review and meta-analysis."



Clemence Quint introduces "P+, An Innovative Parenting Programme in Tunisia" as a new program to support parental skills and practices across Tunisia.



Similarly, Flora Cohen and Gary Agaba present on "Caregiver Psychosocial Programming and Preventing Harm to Children," to combat the exacerbated health strains caregivers endure while living in fragile contexts.



Thematic Session 1b: Learning from Across Sectors: GBV, Health, ECD, and Multisectoral Approaches begins with Jessica Lenz and Neil Dillon presenting on "Improving the Evidence Base for GBV Prevention in Humanitarian Crises: A results-based evaluation framework for GBV prevention." Sabine Raktomalala and Mathilde Boddaert explained how violence against children and its determinants can be mitigated through a multisectoral health system. Susan Crowley presented on a new science design to improve child outcomes from the start of child development







The last thematic session for Day 1, "Preventing Harm to Children Affected by Armed Conflict" was kicked off with a session on "How to Develop Interventions to Prevent the Recruitment & Use of Children," presented by Sandra Maignant. The following sessions, "Preventing Harm to Children in Conflict: Humanitarian Negotiations and Community-Led Child Protection," by Hannah Jordan, Jasminka Milovanovic, and Caroline Veldhuizen and "Knowledge for Prevention," presented by Dr. Catherine Baillie, Abidi, and Tim Lynam discussed the actionable prevention strategies and initiatives that should be implemented to support children affected by armed conflict.

William Chemaly questions whether all humanitarian actors know that the majority of the people they are serving are children. Tasha Gill, from UNICEF, says that working for children's best interests requires the centrality of children and their protection. In addition, Alison Sutton, from Save the Children reminds us that children's active engagement is key to the centrality of children and their protection.






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


Participants shared how they or their organizations are using the Alliance's Child Protection and COVID-19 resources.






A key finding from the stakeholder consultation was that guidance was needed on inter-sectoral collaboration with MHPSS seen as a one key entry point.











Annual Meeting Thematic Sessions: Day 3

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





- IDENTIFYING innovative approaches to working jointly with other sectors on climate adaptation, resilience, preparedness, and responding to climate impacts; and
- EXPLORING other activities and opportunities for collaboration that seek to
 ensure the centrality of children, their protection and their voices, within
 climate action.




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

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Examples of how World Vision is tackling the #ClimateCrisis & #ChildProtection

Tackling climate change and addressing violence against children



Promotion of alternative livelihoods and climate smart agriculture

Promotion of alternative livelihoods - such as beekeeping, gums and resins, ecotourism-relieves the pressure from over-reliance on climate-sensitive livelihoods and increases resilience to climate-related shocks. There are 3,034 Households currently involved in 5 value chains.



Regreening initiatives - Ecosystem Restoration

Though promotion of reforestation initiatives such as Farmer Managed Natural Regeneration, tree nurseries and reseeding we are replenishing fodder and pasture in the rangelands and promoting agroforestry. These programmes are geared towards reducing the conflicts over pasture and water where children are always victims.



Climate Adaptation - Disaster Risk Management

Development and mainstreaming of participatory Community Disaster Risk reduction and Community Disaster Risk Management plans to equip the communities with knowledge on the management of disasters and the recovery after the disasters. This is done alongside child participation and child protection trainings.













Spaces for children's participation on climate & child protection

- Unprecedented moment, with youth voice on climate centre stage. Youthled climate protests have largely focussed on climate change mitigation
- Aware & empowered children & youth have potential to advance climate change adaptation. This includes adaptation advancing child protection
- Despite strong grassroots child & youth-led activism, formal spaces for children's participation on climate action at local, national & global level remain limited
- Children do not have a voice on the child protection mechanisms, policy and laws that affect them in climate disasters


